Parks for All Overview

WHEN November 6, 2018 with 72.6% support

WHAT 1/8 cent sales tax for 10 years

April 1, 2019 – March 31, 2029

WHY Provides dedicated funds to Santa Rosa for parks & recreation needs

- \$1.9M annually
- \$19.1M over 10 years

HOW Requires baseline commitment & Fiscal Oversight Committee


Board of Community Services

- Priority Plan Strategy recommended

Parks for All Uses

- Maintain parks and recreation facilities to ensure safe, clean, accessible visitor experiences
- Decrease future fire risks, fuel loads and invasive plants on City-owned open space parks







Parks for All Uses

- Improve and develop athletic fields, playgrounds, restrooms, picnic areas and visitor amenities
- Create and expand parks, trails, bikeways, public art, and recreational and historical facilities
- Plan and develop bike paths and trails with connections to schools, community spaces and regional trails
- Improve the trails along waterways and riparian areas to benefit fish, wildlife habitat and water quality.



Howarth Memorial Park


How would you like to see Measure M funding prioritized?

Parks Measure Update Strategy

- Board of Community Services recommends grouping like categories - percent of total remaining funds received in years 3-10 (50/40/10)
 - All Capital Improvement categories 50% of funds estimated at approx. \$7 million
 - Maintenance/Decrease Future Fire Risk 40% of funds estimated at approx. \$5.5 million
 - Recreation category 10% of funds estimated at approx. \$1.4 million

Maintenance/Fuel Reduction

Awaiting results of the Parks Condition Assessment

Potential Maintenance Improvements:

- Enhance current landscape contract to include:
 - Weed management within parks
 - Includes landscaped medians and roadside landscape park parcels
- Invasive plant reduction and fuel reduction in parks and open spaces
- Howarth Park tennis court repairs
- Galvin Park tennis court lighting improvements
- Sports Field improvements
- Playground fall protection improvements
- Irrigation system improvements







Capital Project Priorities

- 1. Improve and Develop athletic fields, playgrounds, restrooms, picnic areas and visitor amenities
- 2. Create **and Expand** parks, trails, bikeways, public art, and recreational and historical facilities
- Plan and develop Bike Paths and Trails with connections to schools, community spaces and regional trails
- 4. Improve the **Trails along Waterways** and riparian areas to benefit fish, wildlife habitat and water quality









Capital Projects

- Capital projects
 - New projects
 - Deferred maintenance
 - Amenity replacement
- Common costs for capital projects
 - Playgrounds
 - Lighted, artificial turf, multipurpose sport field
 - Dog Park
 - Acquisition
 - Monument sign





Recreation

- Scenarios
 - 8 years: Recreation is estimated to receive approximately \$173,000/year
 - 6 years: Recreation is estimated to receive approximately \$230,000/year
- Recreation is proposing a 6 year plan for spending, why?
 - COVID uncertainty
 - Sales tax uncertainty
 - Community outreach
 - Preparation





Parks Measure Next Steps

- Parks Condition Assessment
 - Complete Jan/Feb 2022
 - Develop specific projects and plans for community engagement
- Re-engage with the Community
 - Early Spring 2022
 - Receive community priorities for specific capital projects, maintenance enhancements and recreational programming

Parks Measure Next Steps (Con't)

- Implementation
 - Early Summer 2022 Implement capital projects, maintenance enhancements, and recreational programming enhancement strategy
- Reporting/Updates
 - BOCS updates annually
 - Council approval via annual budget update
 - Community updates via outreach
 - Citizens Oversight Committee

Recommendation

• It is recommended by the Transportation and Public Works Department and the Planning and Economic Development Department that Council, by resolution, approve the Parks Measure Priority Plan update for Parks Measure funds received in years 3-10.
