
# Staff Update on NPDES Permit Revisions



#### Timeline

- February 2020 Regional Water Board (RWB) released City's Draft NPDES Permit
- April 2020 City provided 36 separate comments to RWB
- August 2020 RWB modified permit to accept 18 of the City's comments and adopted the permit



#### Timeline

- September 2020 The City filed a Petition for Review of the permit challenging specific provisions in the permit
  - Dissolved oxygen receiving water limit
  - No net load for phosphorus
  - Provisions in the Water Quality Trading Framework (WQTF)
- February 2021 City Council authorized staff to take Petition out of abeyance due to lack of progress in negotiations
- March 2021 RWB and City restarted negotiations
- May 2021 City put Petition back into abeyance
- September 2021 RWB adopted modified permit for the City and the Town of Windsor

## Changes to WQTF in NPDES Permit

- Specifies that the version in the permit is the operative version of the WQTF, not the version adopted by the Regional Board in 2018
- Reduced trading ratios for multi-benefit projects clarified and created new class of projects Permanently Protected Environmental Enhancement Projects (PPEEPs)
- Maximum allowable credit banking went from project life to in perpetuity for PPEEPs
- Clarification of in-time to be consistent with credits lasting in-perpetuity




### Next Steps

- City is participating in multi-agency planning effort to conduct large-scale restoration project on the Laguna de Santa Rosa
- Project is based on a four-year planning effort to restore the Laguna
- Projects would increase water quality, remove invasive species, provide greater flood protection, and give the City compliance certainty
