- **\$2.9m** ARPA Grants RES-2022-029
- **\$1.4m** GF Loan Program RES-2020-177 allocated from CARES Act General Fund monies
- **Children's Savings Acct** (Baby Bonds): CHILD COLLEGE SAVINGS ACCOUNT
- \$1.575m ARPA Grants RES-2022-029

OVERVIEW OF 3-PART PROGRAM

Facility Fund

(current focus)

\$1.4m zero interest revolving loan fund + \$2.9m grant program

- Tenant Improvements in new development and facility preservation
- Architectural, mechanical, electrical, plumbing...
- Permit/inspection fees

Resiliency Fund

(completed)

- \$1m direct grants to providers administered by First 5
- \$100,000 to expand teacher training program administered by 4Cs

Employer Supported Childcare (ongoing)

Policies, programs and other incentives to encourage the development of on-site childcare.

Employers either develop and run the site themselves or provide site for contracted for services.


SANTA ROSA CHILDCARE FACILITY FUND

Eligible Participants

- Local Ed Agencies
- 501(c)3 orgs that operate a state or federal subsidized program (e.g. Head Start)
- Private childcare/preschool operators that accept vouchers/scholarships
- Licensed family childcare owners
- Licensed exempt programs connected to a childcare org

Eligible Expenses

- Construction costs
- Fixtures, finishes and equipment
 - For licensing &/or to improve program quality/outcomes
 - To increase special needs accessibility
 - Outdoor play equipment and functional landscaping
- Mechanical, electrical, plumbing
- Permit & inspection fees
- Architectural design, engineering and site development costs

CHILD COLLEGE SAVINGS ACCOUNT

Program Structure

- First 5 sets up a \$200 college savings plan through the State's ScholarShare529 program.
- \$300 in additional incentives are available based on participation in other qualifying programs.
- A 2nd account may be established by a parent or guardian.
- The market value of the fund is sent directly to the college or career program to offset expenses.

Eligible Participants

- Children age birth to their 5th birthday
- Santa Rosa residents
- Household Adjusted Gross Income of \$75,000 or less

Incentives

- Parents who use qualifying programs/services may earn additional funds.
- Parents/caregivers who open the parent-owned ScholarShare529 account may be matched dollar for dollar.

About 529 Plans & CSAs

- Kids are 3x more likely to attend college and 4x more likely to graduate if they have any amount of savings for their education. Starting young allows the funds to grow.
- A 529 plan is a tax-advantaged investment plan to save for higher education expenses.
- Scholarshare is the State's 529 plan.



About First 5 Sonoma County

- Funded by the 1998 statewide ballot initiative, Proposition 10, which added \$0.50 per pack of cigarettes and other tobacco products.
- Resulting revenues are allocated statewide to First 5 California and to county First 5 Commissions based on birth rate.
- It is an independent public agency that has administered over \$90m in grants over the last 22 years – including the City's Childcare Resiliency Fund Grant Program.
- Prop. 10 funds will be used to offset/support First 5's administrative costs.



It is recommended by the Planning and Economic Development Department that the Council, by resolution, approve a Professional Services Agreement with First 5 Sonoma County for the administration of City of Santa Rosa funded child and childcare programs in a not-to-exceed amount of \$5,875,000.
