eComment: I would like to take this opportunity to comment on the above agenda study item. I was horrified and appalled to learn that City Staff are considering a "safe parking" location next to Maria Carrillo High School. We live on Baird Road having moved there 3 years ago so our daughter could safely walk to Rincon Valley Middle School and Maria Carrillo, she is a Freshman at Carrillo so has not actually been able to walk to school and now if this goes ahead she never will be able to. Over the last year our neighborhood has seen a significant increase in transient/homeless activity, we and our neighbors have had attempted break-ins to our vehicles, mail theft, abandoned vehicles, unsavory characters in our park and our children do not feel safe when walking alone on the streets of Rincon Valley. I completely understand that this point of view may seem uncaring or coming from a family of privilege but I can assure you it is from first hand personal experience. I am the Property Manager for Codding Enterprises and currently over 50% of my job is now spent dealing with homeless issues at our properties in Santa Rosa and Rohnert Park. The crews that work for me spend most of their jobs trying to move on dysfunctional RV's that leave trash, drug paraphernalia and vast amounts of human waste all over, this is sometimes dumped in plastic bags that fall apart when picked up, buckets or more often than not our sidewalks are just used as a toilet, it is vile. I would like to be very clear that the RV owners that have been swarming our properties and would be part of this "safe-parking" program are more than often aggressive to us, disrespectful of our properties, our tenants and visitors. My staff have witnessed drug deals and the like on many occasions. Just this week a

guy came careening off Montecito onto Baird at a high rate of speed (speed wasn't the only thing that was high – he was tweeking like crazy), the turn caused all the bags of recycling and trash in his car to fly up over his face and he lost control and slammed into my neighbors mailbox and a light pole, a couple inches over and he would have hit their cars and house or passersby. Of course expired everything and no insurance. This is exactly what you would be releasing into our neighborhoods every morning when our kids are heading to school. PLEASE DO NOT APPROVE THE RINCON VALLEY LIBRARY AS A SAFE-PARKING SITE.

My name is Teresa Jepson I am a parent of a Carrillo student and this statement is regarding agenda item 3.2 concerning the Safe Parking Pilot Program.

When beginning the study of this program, you used specific criteria when selecting proposed sites to be considered for this program. These criteria included: Proximity to services, proximity to neighborhoods, schools, or childcare and fire risk. The Rincon Valley Library site within District 3 was not identified as a potential site during the initial July 2020 assessment and the city elected to seek a private partner. Then, on the February 2021 assessment, Rincon Valley Library suddenly appeared as a potential location with no reason given for its addition. This site is a poor choice for consideration as the Library is directly adjacent to Maria Carrillo High School. There are students on campus at all hours of the day – arriving at 6:30am for the first classes at 7:00am; continuing through until sometimes 10pm at night for athletic events, musical and choral events, and other club activities. This library is also located in a residential area with little or no homeless services nearby. Additionally, as a fire risk, this site makes a poor choice as fires actually burned several classrooms at Maria Carrillo in 2020 and closely threatened the school in 2017.

The Council seems overly focused on some kind of equitable geographic distribution of this program versus choosing a correct option that might actually benefit these people in need. Instead of trying to put a proverbial square peg in a round hole, why not use existing structures or lots that are designed for parking – garages. After hours at the downtown garage areas would also put these people in geographic proximity to the services that would help them, if they truly want help.

I further feel that the costs associated with this program would amount to a gross misuse of taxpayer funds. Your Single Site Pilot Program cost estimates spending up to \$660,000/yr for just 50 parking spots. When you expand that out to the 300 – 500 vehicle number estimates, that comes to between \$3.96 - \$6.6 million dollars a year. There also seems to be no mention of policies/procedures to ensure that only safe, registered vehicles would be allowed to participate in this program.

I feel that NO SITES in proximity to any schools or childcare facilities within Santa Rosa should be considered for this program.

Dear Honorable Santa Rosa City Council Members,

We write to comment on the Safe Parking Pilot Program you will consider on June 22, 2021 (Agenda Item 3.2). This type of program is an excellent first step in getting Santa Rosa's unhoused population on the road to housing and providing a safer and healthier environment for all our residents.

Hundreds of our neighbors live in their vehicles. According to the most recent Sonoma County Point-in-Time Count, almost a third of the unhoused population resides in vehicles¹ and we know that vehicular homelessness is on the rise across the country.² All their possessions, everything dear to them, is packed into their car or RV. Every day they have to worry about a safe and secure place to park their home. Sleeping in their vehicle overnight is risky and leaving their home parked on the street during the day can also be unsafe, exposing them to possible break-ins or their home being towed away.

By decriminalizing homelessness, safe parking programs help residents avoid interactions with the justice system, and towing and impoundment that can take away people's shelter and push them into debt.³ By helping people stay healthy and connect to appropriate housing services, safe parking may also help reduce costs to public systems. We encourage the city to pass a robust safe parking program to serve the greatest number of our neighbors.

It is encouraging that the staff has identified sites throughout the city. We believe that spreading out safe parking sites addresses segregation and marginalization of our neighbors who live in their vehicles. We hope the city will provide these scattered sites even in the face of opposition from NIMBYs. With a program that includes sanitation facilities and security, safe parking sites will be good neighbors no matter where they are located in the city.

We ask the city to mandate sites to be 24-hour safe parking operations. Many of those who need safe parking cannot afford the gas required to daily move their vehicles and seek out new spots for parking their home during the day. Some are also employed and need to leave their RV or vehicle somewhere while they are at work. Others have RVs or vehicles that are non-operational or not registered and we hope that these obstacles would not prevent them from utilizing the safe parking program. Other considerations include the daily movement of sanitation and security facilities. Our unhoused neighbors would benefit from access to a safe spot throughout the day.

Lastly, we urge the city to use a housing focused model for the safe parking program, including wrap-around services so that any barriers to being housed can be addressed. Because the goal of every safe parking program is to find permanent housing for program participants, providing extensive case management services is a best practice.⁴ Services that address needs like health, income, employment, legal, and housing navigation can stabilize those utilizing the program and ensure their long-term success in securing permanent housing down the road.

Safe parking programs have been operating throughout California and many more jurisdictions are considering these kinds of programs because they work. Santa Rosa City Council should pass a robust pilot program that tracks outcomes effectively and serves as a gateway to housing for many currently unhoused residents of Santa Rosa.

This memo responds to your request for information about the potential health impacts of Safe Parking programs in Sonoma County. For BARHII's broader health and housing guidance during the COVID-19 state of emergency, see our website <u>here</u>.

COVID-19, HOMELESSNESS AND HEALTH

No one should be without a safe, stable, and affordable home. Yet approximately three thousand people are unhoused in Sonoma County at a given time.ⁱ Driven by decades of inequitable policies –from redlining and discriminatory lending to policing—BIPOC communities across the region face dramatically elevated risks of homelessness. In Sonoma County, Black and Indigenous residents are six times more likely to be homeless than the general population.

The COVID-19 pandemic has worsened our homelessness crisis by putting hundreds of thousands of Bay Area residents into financial distress, and either on the brink of, or experiencing homelessness. People experiencing homelessness face increased barriers to staying healthy during this pandemic. For example, many people experiencing homelessness live in environments that are conducive to a disease epidemic, including lack of regular access to basic hygiene supplies and showering facilities, all of which could facilitate virus transmission. They also face serious health issues due to their inability to isolate, quarantine, and recover. Black, Latinx, and Pacific Islander communities in California currently face a 20% higher COVID-19 death rate than the statewide average, driven in part by unstable and crowded housing conditions.ⁱⁱ The homeless population is also disproportionately older—in California, roughly half are 50 years and older—and live with chronic underlying health conditions, which are critical risk factors for contracting COVID-19 and suffering more severe outcomes.

Solving the housing crisis and homelessness may be the single greatest opportunity to improve health in the Bay Area. The intensity of today's housing and health crisis offers us an opportunity to intervene – to prevent and address inequities that are affecting the health of so many of our friends and neighbors. Over the long term, the

Bay Area can solve our housing and homelessness crisis by: protecting residents so they can stay in their homes and neighborhoods; preserving the approximately quarter million homes that are still relatively affordable to rent for lower-income households and many more that are affordable for lower-income homeowners; producing new homes we can afford; and dedicating the resources to provide the services that some need to stay healthy and housed.

REDUCING HEALTH RISKS DURING COVID-19, SAFE PARKING

In the near term, we also need to take actions that protect the health of unhoused people. While we have made solid progress in making vaccines available to unhoused people, it will still be many months before we reach herd immunity. To protect the health and safety, jurisdictions should continue to help people identify housing options, while also working to decrease the health risks of unsheltered living arrangements like vehicles. Specifically, follow <u>CDC guidance</u> to "allow people who are unsheltered or in encampments to remain where they are" to avoid causing "people to disperse throughout the community and break connections with service providers. This increases the potential for infectious disease spread". Cities and counties should also follow CDC guidelines to provide the support necessary to keep unsheltered residents safe by including providing PPE and hygiene supports such as restrooms and handwashing facilities.

Safe Parking programs are one tool to help mitigate the health risks of being unhoused as we work towards permanent housing. Many are already sleeping in their vehicles—the 2020 PIT count found that almost a third of unhoused residents in Sonoma County are living in vehicles,ⁱⁱⁱ and we know that vehicular homelessness is on the rise across the U.S. ^{iv} Successful safe parking programs can help improve health through two primary pathways. First, by providing hygiene and other resources, they can help decrease the spread of disease, and make improvements in people's quality of life. And by decriminalizing homelessness, they help residents avoid interactions with the justice system, and towing and impoundment that can take away people's shelter and push them into debt. ^v Second, these programs can help connect residents to permanent housing—which should be the primary yardstick against which success is measured. By linking residents to housing and resources, safe programs across the country have secured housing for up to two thirds of participants (and as low as 5%). ^{vi} By helping people stay healthy and connect to appropriate housing services safe parking may help reduce costs to public systems.

As the Bay Area works towards solutions to our housing crisis, we should continue to do everything in our power to protect the health of our unhoused friends and neighbors. While safe parking programs are not a permanent solution to homelessness and housing instability, they can be a tool to improve health and reduce the risks of disease transmission—especially for the roughly one thousand people in Sonoma County already living in their vehicles.

My name is Misty Platt and I have lived in Sonoma County for the past 13 years. I have 4 children that are currently going to school at Maria Carrillo and Rincon Valley Middle School. This statement is regarding agenda item 3.2 concerning the Safe Parking Pilot Program.

When beginning the study of this program, you used specific criteria when selecting proposed sites to be considered for this program. These criteria included: Proximity to services, proximity to neighborhoods, schools, or childcare and fire risk. The Rincon Valley Library site within District 3 was not identified as a potential site during the initial July 2020 assessment and the city elected to seek a private partner. Then, on the February 2021 assessment, Rincon Valley Library suddenly appeared as a potential location with no reason given for its addition.

This site is a poor choice for consideration as the Library is directly adjacent to Maria Carrillo High School. There are students on campus at all hours of the day – arriving at 6:30am for the first classes at 7:00am; continuing through until sometimes 10pm at night for athletic events, musical and choral events, and other club activities. This library is also located in a residential area with little or no homeless services nearby. My children go to this library often to wait for me to pick them up from sports practices and after school. Additionally, as a fire risk, this site makes a poor choice as fires actually burned several classrooms at Maria Carrillo in 2020 and closely threatened the school in 2017.

The Council seems overly focused on some kind of equitable geographic distribution of this program versus choosing a correct option that might actually benefit these people in need. Why not use existing structures or lots that are designed for parking – garages. After hours at the downtown garage areas would also put these people in geographic proximity to the services that would help them, if they truly want help.

I further feel that the costs associated with this program would amount to a gross misuse of taxpayer funds. Your Single Site Pilot Program cost estimates spending up to \$660,000/yr for just 50 parking spots. When you expand that out to the 300 – 500 vehicle number estimates, that comes to between \$3.96 - \$6.6 million dollars a year. There also seems to be no mention of policies/procedures to ensure that only safe, registered vehicles would be allowed to participate in this program.

I feel that NO SITES in proximity to any schools or childcare facilities within Santa Rosa should be considered for this program

It is a group of people who are currently residing in their vehicles having lost traditional housing through various life's events. Current programs have less than 10 cars (although we have facilitated up to 20 in one site), the people are registered, the sites have porta-potties or bathrooms and have trash pickup. The areas are kept clean and well monitored by the safe parkers.

All these folks want is to have a safe place to sleep at night, off the streets, so they can rest up for the next day. Ideally, the sites would be open 24/7 so that the residents could get their lives together. Many work, others are seeking work or are trying to "regroup" in between life's incidences. They don't need to be driving around during the day seeking a safe place to park, using up gas and polluting the air, and spending what little money they may have.

Safe Parkers are like any other neighbor group. They just happen to reside in cars or motorhomes instead of houses and they go about their lives as does everyone else. It is great that the City Council is finally seeking places for Safe Parking. There are many people in need and we cannot afford to keep "sweeping" them away and having them lose their possessions and dignity.

The Sonoma County Homeless Census & Survey 2020 sites 38% of homeless people report alcohol or drug abuse in their current health report and 35% have psychiatric/emotional conditions. This is a question of safety for the kids walking past and through that area everyday. Downtown has experienced crime due to homelessness, and I personally have had homeless come up to me cussing or clearly on drugs while in the downtown area. This is not something I want kids dealing with on their daily walk to school or the library. Please reconsider using this parking lot as a safe parking spot for homeless.

We're writing as employees of SRCH's Lombardi Campus so you hear our personal experience as you weigh what to do about Item 3.2 on the agenda for 6/22/2021 – the Safe Parking Pilot. We are located at 751 Lombardi Court and have been facing a homeless encampment for nine months. Every day, 60 employees and over 350 patients must walk or drive through the encampment to get to work and/or to receive critical health care and social supports. (This does not include others on the street like St. Joseph Health dental clinic.)

There is only one way in and out to reach our clinic. This means that we and our patients must find our way along a street and sidewalks that are crowded with debris (including human waste), double-parked vehicles, and doors that are opened into the street. One staff member was assaulted, and another was harassed and blocked from entering her vehicle. Both incidents were reported, but nothing has changed; in fact, it has gotten worse.

It's important you know that 80% of our patients are Hispanic/Latinx, many only speak Spanish, and about 50% of them walk or take the bus. Lombardi Campus also houses a Gender Clinic, where we provider gender-affirming care to over 300 patients from all over Northern California. The conditions with the encampment make it incredibly challenging for all these patients when they *already* face huge barriers to accessing health care. They are afraid to come in for care. Further, because it is not safe, SRCH had to cancel our regular evening clinic, which has always been an important part of caring for patients who cannot get time off during the day or may work multiple jobs.

We're concerned that the safety of our patients is not being prioritized because they are lowincome people of color and gender and sexual minorities. When we have all seen the burden that the Hispanic community has carried during COVID, this is incredibly frustrating. The people living in the encampment also need a safe place to park with supporting services to help them be healthy and to start on the path to permanent housing.

Please approve the safe parking pilot so that everyone impacted – regardless of their skin color, gender, identity, income, history, or housing status – may have equitable access to the services and dignity they need to live a healthy life.
