### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended by the Water Department and the Regional Water Reuse System Technical Advisory Committee that the Board of Public Utilities, by resolution, recommend that the City Council approve the Preliminary 2020/21 Regional Water Reuse System Operating and Maintenance, Capital Improvement, and Debt Service Budget and Allocation of Costs for the purpose of notifying the participating Regional Water Reuse User Agencies of their allocation of such by May 2020.

# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Regional Water Reuse System, managed by the City of Santa Rosa per Agreement, is a state-of-the-art wastewater treatment facility serving five member agencies (Santa Rosa, Rohnert Park, Sebastopol, Cotati, and the Sonoma County South Park Sanitation District, each hereinafter referred to as "User Agency" or collectively as "User Agencies"). The Agreement requires that the City annually prepare a Preliminary Budget and Allocation of Costs for the Regional Water Reuse System and notify the User Agencies of these costs by May of each year. The Agreement further requires that the proposed budget and allocation of costs be reviewed by the Regional Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), the Board of Public Utilities (BPU) and the Council of the City of Santa Rosa prior to noticing the User Agencies of operating and debt service costs due.

The Regional Operations and Maintenance (O&M) Fund budget request is \$31,075,462, the Regional cash-funded Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is \$7,000,000 and the Regional debt service due is \$22,514,346.

Santa Rosa's share of the Regional Water Reuse allocated costs are built into the Wastewater Financial Plan. There is no immediate rate implication to the authorized rate plan from the Fiscal Year 2020/21 proposed budget.

The City Council will be asked to consider the preliminary budget on April 28, 2020 for the purpose of notifying the User Agencies by May 2020 and will review the proposed budget with the city-wide budget study session, currently scheduled to occur on May 19, 2020.

### BACKGROUND

Each year, the Treatment Plant recycles billions of gallons of treated wastewater from homes, businesses and industries located within the Santa Rosa Regional System, which serves the cities of Santa Rosa, Rohnert Park, Sebastopol, Cotati and the Sonoma County South Park Sanitation District.

Operating costs are allocated to the User Agencies based on annual flow into the Plant. The cash funding for CIP, per the Agreement, distributes the allocation based on defined capacities for each User Agency. Debt service costs are allocated according to the time the debt was issued and per the repayment schedule.


### PRIOR CITY COUNCIL REVIEW

Each year the City Council reviews the Preliminary Regional Operations and Maintenance, Capital Improvement Program, and Debt Service proposed budgets and allocation of costs prior to notifying the User Agencies of the allocations.

Additionally, each year the City Council reviews the Regional Operations and Maintenance, Capital Improvement Program, and Debt Service proposed budgets as part of the City-wide budget process in May and June.

### **ANALYSIS**

The Preliminary Regional Water Reuse Operations and Maintenance (O&M) Fund budget request is \$31,075,462, the cash-funded Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is 7,000,000 and the debt service due is \$22,514,346. The budget breakdown is as below:



In general, the major cost drivers include:

- Cash funded CIP \$7,000,000
- Salaries and Benefits
- Debt Service
- O&M budget up 0.6%

Expenditures are offset by earned revenues of \$4,316,776 for various services and agreements that are directly applied to the fund. Projected revenues are up from 2020/21. The remainder of the required revenue is billed to the User Agencies.

Operating costs are allocated based on metered prior flow into the plant, so the actual impact to each User Agency can vary slightly year to year as flows fluctuate. The total due from each User Agency for operations is based on 2018/19 flows (in million gallons):

Cash funded CIP costs are allocated based on each User Agency's capacity as defined in the Agreement:

Debt service is owed by the Regional Water Reuse system for a variety of bonds and state loans that have financed facility and process improvements over the years. Debt service payments are allocated to each User Agency based on the time the debt was issued and the corresponding debt repayment schedule.

### FISCAL IMPACT

Santa Rosa's share of the Regional Water Reuse allocated costs are built into the Wastewater Financial Plan. There is no immediate rate implication to the authorized rate plan from the Fiscal Year 2020/21 proposed budget.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

This action is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it is not a project which has a potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment, pursuant to CEQA Guideline section 15378.

#### BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Budget Subcommittee of the Board of Public Utilities reviewed and recommended approval of the proposed Regional budget at a meeting on March 10, 2020.

The proposed Regional budget recommendation was reviewed and recommended for approval by the Regional TAC at a meeting on March 12, 2020.
