

General Plan Amendment to Noise & Safety Element







September 12, 2024

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- Proposed General Plan Amendment includes changes to the Noise and Safety Element of General Plan 2035
- Initiated because Assembly Bill No. 2140 (AB 2140) which allows counties and cities to be considered for additional state cost-share
- City's current Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) was adopted by the City Council in December of 2021
- Developed in accordance with the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 (DMA 2000) and followed FEMA's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan guidance





- September 29, 2006, the Governor of California signed Assembly Bill 2140, which allows California cities to be considered for additional state cost-share on eligible Public Assistance projects by adopting current, FEMA approved LHMPs into the Safety Element of its General Plan.
- November 3, 2009, the Council adopted General Plan 2035, which includes the Noise and Safety Element as one of the eight State mandated elements; and
- December 7, 2021, the Council adopted Volume 1 of the Multijurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan (MJHMP) and updated the City's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan by adopting the City of Santa Rosa Annex to Volume 2 of the MJHMP dated October 2021.

12-2 DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

The Santa Rosa Emergency Operations Plan addresses how the city will respond to extraordinary events or disasters, from preparation through recovery. It includes a comprehensive assessment of potential hazards and threats, and sets forth policies and procedures pertaining to emergency planning, organization, and response. The plan is based on the principles and functions of the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS). Additionally, in 2006 2021, the City adopted a Local Hazard Mitigation Plan¹ (LHMP) which is incorporated by reference and integrated into this Element to ensure consistency with the LHMP. The plan's overall goal is to make Santa Rosa a disaster resistant community by reducing the potential loss of life, property damage, and environmental degradation from natural disasters while accelerating economic recovery. The Sonoma County Fire and Emergency Services Department is the lead agency for the Sonoma Operational Area and the City is one of nine incorporated cities within the organizational boundary.

12-8 GOALS AND POLICIES

NS-A Prepare for disasters.

NS-A-1 Maintain the Emergency Operations Plan as the city's disaster-response plan. Work with Sonoma County to update joint-emergency response and disaster response plans, as needed.

NS-A-2 Continue to promote the Citizens Organized to Prepare for Emergencies (COPE) public awareness program on the nature and extent of natural hazards in the Planning Area, and ways of minimizing the effects of disasters.

NS-A-3 Establish community programs which train volunteers


NS-A-4 Implement the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan to better prepare Santa Rosa for

General Plan Amendment Findings

- The proposed amendment ensures and maintains internal consistency with the goals and policies of all elements of the General Plan.
- The proposed amendment would not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience, or welfare of the City.
- The site is physically suitable (including absence of physical constraints, access, compatibility with adjoining land uses, and provision of utilities) for the requested/anticipated land use developments; and
- The proposed project has been reviewed in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).



Environmental Review California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

- General Plan 2035 Environmental Impact Report was certified by the Council on November 3, 2009
- Amendment within the scope of the General Plan EIR
- Project does not require further environmental review under CEQA Guidelines Section 15183





It is recommended by Planning and Economic Development Department that the Planning Commission, by resolution, approve the General Plan Amendment to the Noise and Safety Element of General Plan 2035.





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
