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# Background

### 1. Ordinance No. 2018-004 Adopted

 On March 20, 2018, Ordinance 2018-006 added Article V to City Code Chapter 6-56, enabling the establishment of CBDs

#### 2. Resolution No. RES-2018-077 Adopted

 On May 22, 2018, following the submittal of a sufficient number of qualified petitions by district property owners, Council adopted a Resolution of Intention to establish the district (RES-2018-077), triggering the ballot process.

#### 3. Ballot Packets Mailed

- In June 2018, CBD ballot packets were mailed to property owners.
- The District may be established, and assessments levied for the Fiscal Year starting July 1, 2018, if a majority of the weighted returned ballots vote in favor of the formation.


# **Proposed CBD** Area

## **Ballot Process**

## **1. Weighted Ballots**

- Weight is determined by the dollar amount each property owner will be paying. Owners of the largest properties/buildings/lot size/street frontage and within a specific benefit zone, will be subject to paying more, and therefore have their votes count in proportion to what they will pay.
- Council may impose an assessment if there is a weighted majority in favor.

### 2. Public Hearing Ballot Tabulation

- At the conclusion of the public hearing, all ballots will be delivered to the City Clerk
- Ballots will be available at the hearing should owners appear and desire to cast their ballot; ballots previously cast by owners wishing to withdraw their vote will be removed from tabulation.

## 3. Tabulation Process

- Ballot Extraction: numerically ordered envelops opened and ballots removed.
- Ballot Inspection: ballots inspected for signature and clearly marked vote.
- **Recording of Vote:** ballot number and yes or no vote will be read aloud and entered into a spreadsheet.
- Interpretation of Ballot Marks: The City Clerk and City Attorney will make rulings on interpretation of ballot choices as needed, as well as questions re: validity of ballots cast with questions.

### 4. Report of Results

 Upon tabulation of all ballots, and prior to the adjournment of the City Council meeting, the City Clerk will report ballot results, and the Council may then take action on the motion.

# **CBD:** Recommendation

It is recommended by the Planning and Economic Development Department that the Council: 1) hold a public hearing to consider oral and written testimony regarding the formation of a community benefit improvement district, and tabulate all assessment ballots returned to the City pursuant to procedures set forth in the Resolution of Intention; and 2) if the assessment balloting does not result in a majority protest, then waive first reading and approve the Resolution Forming the Santa Rosa Downtown Community Benefit District and Levying and Collecting the Assessment in Connection Therewith.
