### 13.1 REPORT - SANTA ROSA TOURISM BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT AREA ANNUAL REPORT

BACKGROUND: The Santa Rosa Tourism Business Improvement Area (SRTBIA) was established on September 3, 2010, by Ordinance No. 3946. The ordinance requires an annual report to the City Council that details recommended changes to the Area boundaries; improvements and activities provided; an estimate of the cost of providing improvements and activities; the method and basis of levying assessments, the amount of any surplus or deficit revenues to be carried over; the amount of contributions from

sources other than assessments and recommendations. The Annual Report is due to the Director of Economic Development and Housing by June 1 of each year.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended by the Department of Economic Development and Housing that the Council, by motion: (1) approve the Fiscal Year 2014/2015 SRTBIA Annual Report prepared by the Department of Economic Development and Housing, and approved by the SRTBIA Advisory Board; and (2) adopt the SRTBIA Work Plan for Fiscal Year 2015/2016.

<u>Rochelle Wattz</u> spoke in support of performing a fair analysis on vacation rentals in the community and the revenue they generate and suggested the City promote Santa Rosa wine.

#### 13.2 REPORT - BICYCLE FRIENDLY COMMUNITY APPLICATION

BACKGROUND: The Bicycle Friendly Community (BFC) is a designation provided to a city by the League of American Bicyclists, a national non-profit advocacy group. The designation is based on a community completing an online application with approximately 90 questions.

To be included in the next review cycle, the City needs to submit the Bicycle Friendly Community application by August 11, 2015. It is expected that the designations will be awarded in November 2015.

The benefits of becoming a Bike Friendly Community are:

- community recognition
- formation of new partnerships and momentum for bicycle improvements
- credential that strengthens grant applications for bicycle projects
- credential that strengthens messaging related to education, encouragement, evaluation, and enforcement.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended by the Transportation and Public Works Department that the Council, by resolution, approve the submission of the Bicycle Friendly Community application to the League of American Bicyclists.

### 13.3 REPORT - MEASURE O IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AMENDMENT - FIRE DEPARTMENT

BACKGROUND: On August 3, 2004, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 3680 adding Chapter 3-26 to the Santa Rosa City Code, which imposed a special transactions and use tax. The special tax (Measure O) was subsequently approved by a 2/3 majority of voters in the November 2004 election. The special tax generates revenues which are required to be split 40% - 40% - 20% and used for Police, Fire, and Gang Prevention and Intervention Programs, respectively.

In accordance with Chapter 3-26, the Council adopted a Transaction and Use Tax Implementation Plan on September 21, 2004 by Resolution No. 26069, which outlines the uses and purposes for which the special tax revenues may be used over time. Santa Rosa City Code Section 3-26.120 specifies that the Plan may only be amended by six affirmative votes of the Council.

The Fire Department has identified a need for ALS paramedic services on all engines and trucks. There are currently paramedics on fire engines and this action will allow the Fire Department to staff paramedics on the City's two ladder trucks. This will provide more advanced medical capabilities for two current pieces of responding fire apparatus. When other fire apparatus are committed on emergencies these units are available to respond to medical calls for service. Currently the trucks are not staffed with paramedics on a regular basis. The addition of ALS capabilities to these units will reduce the timeframe between the 911 call and the arrival of the first ALS unit. This allows the Fire Department to deliver a more effective level of service to the citizens of Santa Rosa.

The Fire Department is requesting to use Measure O funding to pay for the 10% incentive for Firefighters to be utilized as paramedics on the ladder trucks

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended by the Fire Department that the Council, by resolution, amend the Transaction and Use Tax Implementation Plan to use approximately \$60,000 of Measure O Fire Department funding to enhance Fire Department services by upgrading two ladder trucks to Advanced Life Support paramedic status.
