

WHEREAS, the African culture, like many others, celebrates the change from childhood to spiritual adulthood. Girls and boys are separated from everyday life and taught appropriate cultural standards such as: responsibility, family values, respect for God, respect for elders, self-esteem, respect for family and other cultural traditions; and

WHEREAS, the Rev. James E. Coffee, Ms. Shirley Gordon, and the Community Baptist Church founded the Rites of Passage program in 2000 to serve as a multi-cultural mentoring and skills building program designed for youth transitioning from childhood to adulthood; and

WHEREAS, in the Bridge to the Future – Rites of Passage program, adult mentors have adopted the role of elders passing on the principles of self-awareness, purpose and responsibility through a series of workshops and group interactions to more than 300 local youth, ages 14-18years. Youth attend an eight-month course focusing on self-awareness, team building, wellness, etiquette, cultural awareness, financial planning, public speaking, community outreach, and college and career readiness; and

WHEREAS, Bridge to the Future – Rites of Passage became a 501(c)3 in February 2015, operating under a Board of Directors and expanding the program beyond the church to the broader Santa Rosa community; and

WHEREAS, since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month, a time in which we honor the work, efforts and achievements by black Americans and a time for which we recognize the central role of African Americans in U.S. history.
