

City of Santa Rosa: 2018 Santa Rosa Community Needs Assessment Survey

July 2018

Overview and Research Objectives



The City of Santa Rosa commissioned Godbe Research to conduct a tracking survey of local voters with the following research objectives:

- Gauge the public's perceptions of whether the City is headed in the right direction;
- Gauge satisfaction with provision of City services;
- Assess potential support for an affordable housing bond to provide affordable housing with funding that cannot be taken by the State;
- Prioritize projects and programs to be funded with the proceeds;
- Test the influence of informational and critical statements on potential support;
- Identify the preferred rate; and
- ➤ Identify any differences in voter support due to demographic and/or voter behavioral characteristics.



Q1. Opinion on Direction of City (n=1,467)








Q2. Satisfaction with City's Provision of Services (n=1,467)





Q3. Uninformed Support for Bond Measure (n=1,467)






To provide affordable local housing for low- and middle-income families. veterans, seniors, persons with disabilities, and other vulnerable people and families; provide supportive housing for the homeless that includes mental health and substance abuse services; and help low- and middle-income households purchase homes in their communities, shall the City of Santa Rosa issue \$167 million dollars in bonds, levying \$12 million dollars annually at approximately \$39 dollars per \$100,000 assessed value while bonds are outstanding, subject to citizen oversight and audits?





 - L. The measure will provide services to make housing more affordable to working families
- A. The measure will help prevent long-time residents who have lived here for decades and young people who were born and raised here from being forced out of Santa Rosa
- C. The measure will help provide affordable homes for the poorest and most vulnerable members of our community including senior citizens and veterans
 - E. There is a 2,300 unit shortfall of affordable workforce housing in Santa Rosa. The measure will provide innovative solutions to this problem






Q6. Critical Statements (n=1,467)






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Q8. Support for Different Rates (n=1,467)







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
