RE: 24-Hour Safe Parking Ordinance

To our esteemed City Leaders -

I am writing to express my strong support for the Safe Parking Ordinance under consideration by the City Council.

Santa Rosa Community Health (SRCH) provides comprehensive primary care to more than 40,000 low-income and uninsured people residing in the greater Santa Rosa area, thousands of whom are experiencing homelessness. We have a dedicated clinical team and outreach staff that focus on providing care to people who are unhoused. This is a core part of our mission and we are dedicated to ensuring that all people have access to care – no matter what.

Additionally, SRCH has a health center located on Lombardi Court. For the past many months there has been a significant homeless encampment (mostly RVs) on Lombardi Court. This encampment has created an environment where our staff and patients no longer feel safe coming and going from the clinic. Many of our patients walk to the health center along the entire street through the encampment, as do all of our 120 employees who work there because we reserve our limited parking for patients. There are needles, garbage and feces being left on the sidewalk and around the outside of the health center. Several weeks ago, a person encamped on the street assaulted one of our contract employees.

We already have had to assign two security guards to monitor the clinic and we are investing in additional lighting and possibly cameras to create a safer environment. We have worked closely with the City Police, the Housing and Community Services Director, and the HOST team to try to address the situation. They have done their very best, but their hands are tied because they have no place to move the encamped people to.

A 24-Hour Safe Parking ordinance would provide a safe and supported place for people to park their cars and RVs and provide a resource for the City staff to safely move people to an alternate location with consequences if they don't. We are dedicated to caring for all people – and we need all patients and staff to be able to receive care without fear or exposure to unsafe conditions.

Dear Council Members,

I am attaching a copy of the email from my prospective tenant who was so excited to move into our space and has now canceled after doing a second look in the early morning hours finding the homeless problem is even worse than what it was the day before. We have lost two huge tenants due to Covid which is unfortunate and can't be fixed quickly. This is a problem that can be remedied and has not yet been. I do not accept the response that nothing can be done until the shelter in place is lifted, these people deserve shelter. It does not need to be in my doorway. I have cleaned up all the foil wrappers from the meth heads, human feces repeatedly and picked up untold amounts of garbage left on our property. **This is unacceptable on so many levels.**

I did hear from an existing tenant that they received a letter from the city asking if no parking at night would bother their business. This was a thoughtful offer. As a property owner, NOTHING was sent to me. Nevertheless, it is a first step and appreciated.

I rarely see police monitoring the situation. I am not faulting them, their job must be heartbreaking.

Humans deserve shelter, clean food, sanitary facilities, and water. They are getting NONE of this and we all suffer because they are suffering so tremendously.

Property owners deserve their proportionate share of the City services that we pay for--this includes a governmental safety net for these poor people at such a desperate time. We can't pay our property taxes if we don't have income. We can't keep our building if we can't attract businesses. If we can't keep our building, you don't get paid.

Please be on notice that your efforts so far are failing and you have to change tactics--just as the surviving businesses are doing.

No businesses equals no jobs and more homeless families.

I want to hear back from each of you about something **new** that you are trying to help these people. Don't bother telling me that the shelter was closed down because of an outbreak. I know that and it is STILL NO EXCUSE. You should have had back up plans in the event that an outbreak occurred.

Mayor and City Council,

We are writing to provide input for the **February 9 study session on current and proposed homeless programs**. As residents of the St. Rose Neighborhood (one of the two neighborhoods most impacted in our city by the homeless and homeless services - the other being West End), we know first-hand that what the City has been doing has yet to translate into less folks living on our streets. Clearly, the Housing First model has not performed as expected and should not be the only model we use. For that reason, we look forward to the city attempting different approaches to address this issue. The Cahoots program is a good first step in trying something else. As we all struggle to determine what programs will result in getting more folks sheltered and off our streets, here are some suggestions and concerns I hope you will consider:

1. Safe Parking:

- It is encouraging to see the City propose implementing this program in each district. However, I'm concerned that the location staff is proposing for District 2 (the Burbank Medical Center) is on the border of the downtown area even though District 2 covers a large area east and south of downtown. Santa Rosa Fire Station #4 seems a more appropriate location than one so close to downtown. Also, with the majority of services already in our downtown District 5, even adding parking at City Hall is questionable. I would suggest the Bennett Valley Senior Center is a better location for District 5 since there is probably another year or more before that property is developed.
- The "Housing Focused" option would be our preference, otherwise, we aren't getting these folks out of their cars and off the streets. We are just warehousing them on City property. It also provides security services which would allay some of the concerns residents of other district may have to accepting this program near their neighborhoods. To take it one step further, I would hope the city would make it a requirement that in order to use the Safe Parking lots users must accept alternative forms of shelter or housing if offered.

2. RV Parking Ordinance

- Yes to every part of this ordinance! although we'd like the city to provide more
 detail on why it would cost \$100K annually. Has the possibility of using SRPD
 trained volunteers to help reduce cost been considered (similar to the
 abandoned car program)? Also, can some or all of the funds come out of the
 SRPD budget since I believe calls regarding illegal RV parking are currently
 handled by the SRPD?
- We would strongly suggest a contract with an additional towing company
 capable of towing RVs. Currently, it is our understanding the City currently only
 contracts with one company that can tow RV's which delays the response time.

3. Alternative Shelter

- Consider adding a daytime shelter so folks have a place to go once they leave the facilities that only provide night accommodations.
- Is there any data on the (County's?) Fairgrounds program? What about data outlining the results of the Los Guilicos Village? As a matter of fact, it still states on the County's web page that the Los Guilicos program was to end in April 30, 2020. https://sonomacounty.ca.gov/Homeless-Emergency/Los-Guilicos-Village/
- Even the City's web page on last year's Safe Social Distancing program at the Finley Center program doesn't list metrics for what is considered a success and detailed data on results beyond stating "154 people served". The quote below if from this City webpage: https://srcity.org/3355/Safe-Social-Distancing-Program

"The City is working closely with the program operator, Catholic Charities, to find shelter placements for all individuals currently residing at the SSDP prior to the closure of the site."

How many people were able to find shelter placement through Catholic Charities? If this was a goal, shouldn't those numbers be posted with a breakdown of permanent vs temporary shelter?

• Finally, the City's posted data needs to be kept current. This link to the Homeless Services Dashboard has no information for 2020:

Without data, we have no evidence how successful any programs have been in permanently moving people off our streets. If an RFQ is put out for a service provider to run a similar facility, it needs to include expectations using metrics and timelines for providing data (quarterly at a minimum). Not only is this to provide transparency for residents, but to be able to determine if the program is successful. For the amount of \$ that the City is spending to fund homeless programs, residents need to know that they are working.

4. Other

- I urge the City to make sure the outgoing phone message for HOST is
 professional and provides the information that should be left by the caller to
 have an effective response. Both the HOST and HEAP contractors should be
 required to post a ticket for each call with details on when they interacted with
 a person or encampment and the results (as much as can be legally
 publicized) similar to the My Santa Rosa program:

- There needs to be an acknowledgement by the Department of Housing & Community Services that encampments next to neighborhoods cause quality of life issues for residents in those neighborhoods. These include needles, feces, and trash on sidewalks, theft of items from our front yards and porches, blocking pedestrian and bicycle routes, etc. Staff from that department should be reaching out to those neighborhoods near encampments on a regular

basis to see what they can do to mitigate these issues. Additionally, we should not have to report encampments in areas where they are chronic. If the City has swept an area, it should be checked regularly to insure encampments have not returned. (Example: the under crossings of Hwy 101 in downtown SR)

- Any facility that provides homeless services in our city should be required to have a Conditional Use Permit covering pertinent items such as hours of operation, parking guidelines, security measures, number of staff to be on site, 24-hour phone line, keeping area around premises clean and free of loitering, etc.
- It is imperative that any homeless services provided by the City require a
 commitment from the recipients to accept services to get help get them off the
 street. Otherwise, the City may see a "build it and they will come" situation
 that will increase the population living on our streets exponentially.
 Additionally, any groups or organizations the City partners with, CANNOT be
 enabling folks to live on the streets (by providing food and other supplies
 when shelter has been offered by the city and/or coaching them on how to
 refuse services).
- Lastly, our City should avoid having this discussion as if Santa Rosa is the
 only municipality able to provide homeless services. Other cities in Sonoma
 County and the County needs to step up and help carry the load. As long as
 the majority of services are in our city, we will have the majority of the
 homeless living on our streets.

Dear Councilmembers.

I will be paying attention to your deliberations starting this week on shelter and services for our homeless fellow residents.

I am pleased to see the well-crafted staff report from HCS Manager Kelli Kuykendall that can encourage you to move ahead with purpose in well-chosen directions.

As for all government projects affecting lives, I emphasize the critical importance of getting input directly from the targeted and affected population(s) and not just their advocates, research studies, and public comments like mine.

In your prioritization, I urge use of various forms of temporary shelter including tents and safe parking of autos and RVs that can be acceptable stopgaps when coupled to strong and consistent social services. Sites throughout the city should be chosen for safety, accessibility to community resources, food, and other necessities without bowing to politics.

Beyond stopgap measures, I look ahead to re-purposing existing properties with or without habitable structures for affordable housing including tiny houses and rehabbed existing structures. Overall, I support long-term solutions built on demonstrated models that are sustainable, and affordable. Although perhaps not as simple as desired, I urge use of a cost-per-person metric that incorporates direct costs for shelter and services, avoided costs for medical care and law enforcement, and includes the benefits of productive employment, education and civic participation. The value to our image as a place where citizens and government create good outcomes may be harder to measure, but I want to be able to raise a glass to that.

Homelessness has a reputation as an insoluble problem. I disagree and look to your leadership for workable solutions consistent with our values and common sense. Make us proud! Thank you,

Sonoma County Commission on Human Rights Reaffirms Need to Respect Human Rights of People Experiencing Homelessness

Pointing to an ongoing human rights crisis impacting unhoused residents of our county, the Sonoma County Commission on Human Rights on January 26, 2021 again called for authorities in the County to respect the rights of the homeless and to take specific steps to help resolve the crisis throughout the County. The Commission wrote its original resolution on this issue on August 28, 2018 based on its own findings as well as convincing evidence of systematic violations presented by the advocate group Homeless Action!

In December 2020, Homeless Action! presented new testimony to the Commission showing that such violations were still a regular occurrence. The 2021 Commission resolution cites the disbanding of encampments, frequently without advance written notice and without appropriate efforts to store and preserve the belongings of evicted campers. A recent example was the January 25, 2021 surprise eviction of campers at Olive Park when sub-zero temperatures were forecast for that night, followed by torrential rains and wind

from an atmospheric river due to hit the following day. One observer said that she stood in shock with campers as they watched their tents, blankets and warm clothing being destroyed by police, leaving them without essential belongings necessary to survive the weather.

When the Commission published its first resolution in 2018, then Chair Kevin Jones said that "It was clear that members of our community face threats on a daily basis due to lack of shelter, and that as a community we are not meeting our responsibility to provide sufficient resources to ensure that each person's right to housing is met." He added that "we have been witness to actions that we believe make individual situations worse among the shelterless, increasing risks to safety and health and reducing a sense of dignity and support of people for whom viable options for housing do not exist."

The new resolution also formally requests that the County of Sonoma and the City of Santa Rosa "immediately cease all actions that violate the fundamental human rights of the unhoused residents of our county, and further that they act to immediately fund and create in all county and city districts safe camping area for immediate use by refugees, with security, hygiene and sanitation facilities, trash collection, housing navigation and all other supporting health and life services as needed."

"Among the most basic human rights of all people is the right to shelter and respite from the elements, and a modicum of privacy," said Jerry Threet, current Chair of the Commission on Human Rights. "By focusing on disbanding encampments without providing housing, local governments deprive such residents of stability and their ability to secure these most basic human rights. It also exacerbates vulnerability to COVID infection during a public health pandemic. It is well past time that local governments stop hounding those who have no realistic alternative to camping in public, and instead provide basic facilities that will allow the unhoused to keep their campsites clean and healthy. 'First, do no harm' should guide all our actions toward the homeless."

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE CONTINUING NEED TO RESPECT THE HUMAN RIGHTS OF PEOPLE IN SONOMA COUNTY EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

WHEREAS, the fundamental human right to housing is recognized in Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and affirmed by Article 11(1) of the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights; and

WHEREAS, U.N. Article 9 guarantees that persons with disabilities have equal access to the physical environment, transportation, information and communications, and the Fourth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibits unreasonable searches and seizures, and the Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibits cruel and unusual punishment; and

WHEREAS, homelessness has become a crisis of historic proportions and options to address the needs of all those without shelter in Sonoma County are woefully inadequate, including the needs of a significant portion of persons experiencing homelessness who require special accommodations due to their physical and/or mental disabilities; and

WHEREAS, local governments have consistently fallen short of the community's obligation to honor the human rights of all residents, and homeless encampments on public lands have been largely forced to exist without local government providing the most basic resources needed to maintain health, such

as essential hygiene comprising access to clean water, restrooms, or other necessities such as security and wraparound services; and

WHEREAS, the Sonoma County Commission on Human Rights on August 28, 2018, resolved and formally requested that the County Board of Supervisors and the Santa Rosa City Council designate an appropriate number of "safe camping areas for immediate use by refugees, with security, hygiene and sanitation facilities, trash collection, housing navigation and all other supporting health and life services as needed," and further resolved and requested that officials in all jurisdictions work to designate such authorized areas in all county and city districts, with adequate funding to preserve Constitutional and ADA rights, yet such solutions have yet to be initiated; and

WHEREAS, the Commission also resolved that the Board of Supervisors and Santa Rosa City Council "with all due haste create and fund sanctioned transitional villages with small living structures with windows and lockable doors" with all services described above as part of the "logical continuum of the Housing First model designed to provide permanent housing solutions for all homeless individuals who seek housing," yet such solutions have yet to be initiated; and

WHEREAS, the County of Sonoma and the City of Santa Rosa are currently subject to the terms of a Preliminary Stipulated Injunction *Vannucci et al. v.*County of Sonoma et al., which includes requirements for notice and offer of adequate shelter before enforcement action is taken against certain people living outdoors on public property, as well as protections for the personal property of those people; and the terns of the Injunction will remain in effect through July 2021, and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of the United States in 2019 upheld the 9th Circuit decision in *Martin v. Boise*, which guaranteed the rights of people camping on public property when adequate shelter is not available, and

WHEREAS, temporary shelter options still remain severely inadequate to meet the needs of 2,000+ unsheltered people in Sonoma County, and local governments have failed to fulfill the requests of this Commission's previous resolutions for relief, and the human rights of people experiencing homelessness still are not respected, and

WHEREAS, in the most recent example of disregard for the human rights of unsheltered residents of Sonoma County, the City of Santa Rosa recently has begun summarily disbanding encampments, without notice and without any effort to store or preserve the belongings of homeless campers, thereby destroying key possessions necessary to survive outdoors (such as tents, blankets, and coats), at a time when government officials know a severe rain storm with below freezing temperatures is imminently approaching;

Dear Santa Rosa City Council,

I am writing regarding Tuesday's study session on safe parking for homeless.

As a resident who is impacted by nearby homeless encampments, thank you for considering this measure. Here are my questions:

- 1. Is this a night only parking situation? If so, how will that help address the many non-running RVs parked around Santa Rosa if they cannot move their vehicles daily?
- 2. Will there be a curfew at the safe parking sites? Will there be a drug and alcohol use policy?
- 3. Will the parks designated as safe parking sites be closed to the public? If not, how will you ensure public safety at these park sites?
- 4. How will you address all of the RV and tent camp dwellers who refuse services? They are in the majority.
- 5. Will non-running RVs be towed? If so, do you plan to add another RV towing service? The current one is overwhelmed with requests.
- 6. How do you envision proposed overnight street parking changes (permits for RVs, etc) will limit long-term parking and help with the problems of people living on the streets?

While I want to support this program, there are many questions that are unanswered about whether this will help. Northwest Community park is near my home, as well as a growing encampment next to Raley's shopping center at Fulton and Guerneville Roads. I have spoken with SRPD as well as HOST on numerous occasions about this encampment. Both are very frustrated, as 'residents' have been coached by groups such as Acts of Kindness on refusing services and shelter. I have been told by HOST and SRPD that only one or two people from that site (which houses easily 20) have accepted services. SRPD characterized that site as a "drug den" and said that residents just want to party and get high all day. SRPD also stated that the Raley's shopping center has a problem with theft and shoplifting since that encampment grew. So how will a move to safe parking sites help clear an encampment such as this where its residents are service resistant and not interested in getting a hand up, and where most of their RVs appear to be non-functioning and are never moved?

Additionally, I would like to see hard data about previous city cites such as Finley. How many people from this site moved into into permanent supportive housing? Of those, how many stayed in that housing, and for how long?

I work closely with the homeless population in the City of Santa Rosa to remove legal barriers to housing. One of the questions I hear most often is "Where can I safely park my RV?" A significant part of our homeless population lives in their vehicles or RVs and recently this has risen with loss of housing due to fires, higher cost of living, and health risks related to the pandemic.

I urge you to support low-barrier safe parking throughout the city for as many households as possible. As identified in the staff report, there are good choices for sites located in every part of Santa Rosa. Removing vehicles and RVs that people live in from our streets costs the city money and deprives our neighbors of their homes. Risk of contracting and spreading COVID-19 remains a danger and congregant living is not a viable option for many of our residents due to age or disability. It is especially vital to provide Safe parking is an important and concrete step towards reducing homelessness in our city.
