

Senate Bill 1205 Fire Protection Services Inspection Compliance Reporting

BACKGROUND

On December 2, 2016, a fire broke out in a warehouse, known as Ghost Ship, that had been converted into an artist collective, including dwelling units, in the Fruitvale neighborhood of Oakland, California. A total of 36 people were killed in the fire, and it became the deadliest in the history of the city. It was also the deadliest building fire in the United States since The Station nightclub fire in 2003, and the deadliest in California since the 1906 San Francisco earthquake. The tragedy at Ghost Ship brought national attention and put a spotlight on fire safety laws and inspection in California.



BACKGROUND

On September 27, 2018, SB 1205 became effective, and added a new section to the California Health and Safety Code which affects every fire department or fire district in the State. Existing state law requires every fire department or district providing fire protection services to inspect every building used as a public or private school annually. This same annual inspection requirement is applicable to hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment houses.



DEFINED

<u>Educational Group E Occupancies</u> are generally those public and private schools, used by more than six persons at any one time for educational purposes through the 12th grade.

<u>Residential Group R Occupancies</u>, for the purpose of this resolution, are generally those occupancies containing sleeping units, and including hotels, motels, apartments (three units or more), etc. as well as other residential occupancies (including a number of residential care facilities). These residential care facilities have a number of different sub-classifications, and they may contain residents or clients that have a range of needs, including those related to custodial care, mobility impairments, cognitive disabilities, etc. The residents may also be nonambulatory or bedridden.

GROUP E OCCUPANICES

During calendar year 2019, within the City of Santa Rosa, there were a total of 127 known Group E Occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. The Fire Department completed the annual inspection of 127 facilities. This is a compliance rate of 100% for this reporting period.

During calendar year 2020, within the City of Santa Rosa, there were a total of 120 known Group E Occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. The Fire Department completed the annual inspection of 110 facilities. This is a compliance rate of 92% for this reporting period. This is an indication of impacts of Covid-19 during the 2020 calendar year.

GROUP R OCCUPANCIES

During calendar year 2019, within the City of Santa Rosa, there were a total of 846 known Group R Occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. The Fire Department completed the annual inspection of 851 Group R facilities. This is a compliance rate of over 100% for this reporting period, this includes the completion of those inspections from previous reporting period.

During calendar year 2020, within the City of Santa Rosa, there were a total of 842 known Group R Occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. The Fire Department completed the annual inspection of 799 Group R facilities. This is a compliance rate of over 95% for this reporting period. This is an indication of impacts of Covid-19 during the 2020 calendar year. As of the date of this presentation we have achieved 100% completion of mandated inspections.
