

#### ADA Self-Evaluation & Transition Plan

City Council Meeting August 3, 2021 Jason Nutt Assistant City Manager

- Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires local public entities to:
  - Complete a Self-Evaluation of their facilities, programs, activities and services to determine barriers to persons with disabilities
  - Develop an ADA complaint procedure
  - Designate a person who is responsible for overseeing ADA compliance
  - Develop a Transition Plan to identify any structural modifications necessary for compliance

- City of Santa Rosa's Self-Evaluation and Transition Plan
  - Completed in 1993
  - Updated in 2006
  - Amended in 2012

- Self-Evaluation is a public entity's assessment of:
  - Programs, services and activities: Police, Fire,
    Citybus, building permits, recreation programs,
    website services, sidewalk
  - Facilities: public buildings, parking lots/garages and parks
  - Policies, practice and procedures: service animals, communications, sign language interpreters

- Facilities Transition Plan
  - Site survey to identify barriers
  - Create a report to document:
    - Barriers found
    - Conceptual solutions
    - Cost estimates
    - Priority level of the barrier removal
    - Location of the barriers at the facility

### **ANALYSIS**

#### Funding:

- Compliance for most programs, services, activities, policies, practice and procedures are funded through department operations
- Sidewalks and curb ramps: mostly gas tax and capital facilities fees
- Non-general fund facilities: department operations and capital project funding
- Parks and general fund facilities: \$1.2M annual capital project funding request
  - General funds not invested for FY 20-21

### **ANALYSIS**

- Staff stakeholders meet annually to:
  - Review budget and project status of general fund parks and facilities project
  - Identify new projects if the annual \$1.2M is appropriated in the new fiscal year

#### **ANALYSIS**

- Criteria for prioritizing facilities for barrier removal:
  - Quantity and frequency of public use
  - Uniqueness of the facility
  - Age or condition of the facility
  - Geographical distribution of services or programs within the facility
  - Critical nature of the programs offered at the facility
- Within the facility:
  - Parking and access from site arrival points to programs and services are the highest priority

### ONGOING NEEDS

- Estimated over \$25M additional needs for general fund facilities and parks to meet the minimum regulatory compliance
- Regulatory changes to the ADA and California Building Code
- Vandalism
- Deferred maintenance, and lifting/cracking from tree roots or shifting soils
- Updates to the Transition Plan
