The General Plan Update process, known as **Santa Rosa Forward**, provides an important opportunity to **revisit** and **rethink** community planning policies and programs.












Also includes a Comment Form, the ability to sign up for email updates, and links to surveys.



#### 5.1 RECREATION, PARKS, AND OPEN SPACE FINDINGS

#### Recreation and Par

- The City of Santa Rosa's current General Plan sets a goal of six acres of parkland for every 1,000 Santa Rosa residents—twice the State standard and national average.
   Santa Rosa has nearly achieved this goal, with 5.9 acres of park and open space land per 1,000 residents.
- Parkland in Santa Rosa is well distributed geographically, and a majority of residents
  have access to parks or open space areas within a half mile of their homes. This
  include neighborhoods designated by the State as "Communities of Concern"
  (which in other cities often specifically lack easy access to parks or open space).
- The City is committed to maintaining and improving the community's access to quality parks now and in the future by: (a) ensuring safe, walkable access to parks for all residents; (b) continuing to offer valuable programming, including youth enrichment programs; and (c) maintaining high-quality park amenities.

#### Regional Open Space and Tra

- 4. Open space areas of various sizes are integrated into many of the city's parks and contribute to the overall preservation of recreational land in the Planning Area. Open space areas purposely have minimal improvements to preserve the natural setting
- Larger open space a reas in the Planning Area are generally developed in association with the Sonoma County Agricultural Preservation and Open Space District and the Sonoma County Water Agency under joint acquisition and maintenance agreements. These spaces are counted toward the standard of 1.1 acres of publicserving open space per J.Oor oesidents.

#### Fire Damage and Park Restoration


6. The 2017 Tubbs Fire damaged approximately 75 acres of parkland across 10 park sites in Santa Rosa. This included damage to community parks, neighborhood parks, and landscaped and natural open space areas. The City is currently (2020) in the process of restoring nine of the 10 parks, including the full rebuild of the Coffey Neibhorhoof Park.






# Community Survey #1: The Heart of Your Neighborhood


Open Feb to March 2021, this survey included questions about community health, ways people would like to be engaged, and an exercise to "Map Your Neighborhood."

Over **1,300** Santa Rosans completed the survey!




#### Map the Heart of Your Neighborhood







#### What makes this the heart of your neighborhood?




# What are the most important changes you would like to see in the City of Santa Rosa?

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is comprised of technical experts from City departments and partner agencies that provide feedback on the project and ensure plan concepts can be achieved.




The TAC has met regularly to confirm data and information and provide insights into the Visioning process.

The CAC is a key part of the community engagement strategy.


They are a community-based Advisory Committee that are acting as liaisons to help the City reach out to the full Santa Rosa community.


















## Community Vision Workshops (District-wide)

Learn about the Santa Rosa Forward process and the importance of the General Plan



# How Are Community Comments Being Used?

The Project Team heard a wealth of comments and ideas (3,000+) during the recent engagement efforts, organized into five broad categories.

**Vision Statement** 

Comments helped confirm and/or refine the Draft Vision Statement.

Assets/What You Love About Santa Rosa

COMMENTS

Comments helped identify current policies, programs, topics, or areas that are working well and need to be supported in the future.

Opportunities and Challenges

Comments helped inform important community concerns and ideas that will be included in the Alternatives Phase.

Engagement Methods

Includes feedback on how people would like to be engaged, which will help inform the Community Involvement Strategy (CIS)

Other Comments or Questions

Includes comments that are not directly related to the General Plan Update (but will be tracked by staff) or questions staff will respond to.

General Plans include vision statements as **aspirational statements** framing community needs and desires.

Vision statements are important because new or updated goals, policies, and programs in the General Plan will need to reflect them and their direction.

The **Vision Statement** is organized around key topics.

The initial statements were based on ideas from the community, Community Advisory Committee, and City staff.

The statements were further refined and confirmed by the community in May and June through workshops, meetings, and surveys.



#### Draft General Plan Community Vision

#### Santa Rosa is a place where:

- Just: Social and environmental justice is achieved for everyone—all abilities, ages, ethnicities, gender identities, immigrants, income levels, language speakers, races, religions, sexual orientations. EVERYONE.
- Sustainable: Natural resources,—including streams and creeks, trees and landscaping in public places, and community and rooftop gardens—are restored, protected, and expanded to provide accessible green space for everyone in all neighborhoods, mitigate drought, and minimize greenhouse gas emissions.
- Inclusive: Everyone is welcome; and all people and groups are actively encouraged to join in neighborhood and citywide decision making, and barriers to participation are identified and eliminated
- Healthy: Neighborhoods are healthy, vibrant, <u>connected, full-service communities, with the resources to be civically organized, and anchored by inclusive and accessible public outdoor spaces and buildings offering safe and welcoming places for <u>everyone</u>.

- Resilient: All facets of the community, including housing, infrastructure, and social services are sustainable and resilient to hazards and economic changes and hazards.
- Prepared: The health and safety of All rasidants/everyone is supported by are neighborhood.
   City, and county-wide efforts to prepare foraware of the risks of natural and human-caused hazards, and roadways are optimized to support efficient evacuations are engaged in neighborhood and City emergency preparedness efforts.
- Sheltered: A diverse mix of high quality, safe, thoughtfully designed, efficiently planned, and well-served housing at all affordability levels is available throughout the community to accommodate everyone, including formerly homeless, immigrants, local workers, amultisenerational households, seniors, and students and formerly homelesses exidents.
- Equitable: Everyone has convenient and equitable and affordable access to meet their daily needs—including healthy food, recreation, education, childcare, employment opportunities, reliable internet, and physical and mental health services—and community members enjoy long fulfilline, healthy lives.
- Successful: Top employers gravitate; Black, Latino/Latina-, and other minority-owned businesses are in all corners of the community: goultable investments are made in all neighborhoods; local shops, food and beverage establishments and food trucks, sourism-and

- entertainment spaces support a vibrant city; and meaningful work in a thriving economy is available for people of all ages and backgrounds.
- Connected: High-quality, reliable, and safe transit service, bicycle and pedestrian facilities, and
  other forms of mobility connect all ages across the city and region at all times and support
  healthy lifestyles, clean air, equity, and resilience.
- Safe: Streets are safe; Pgublic safety services are provided by caring and thoughtful community
  members who are representative of and familiar with the neighborhoods, groups, and
  individuals they serve; and everyone, including immigrants and people of color, can safely access
  these services.
- <u>Educated: Life-long education, enrichment, and supportive services and resources engage and empower young people, strengthen families (of any family structure), connect and activate seniors, and foster the success and well-being of all-peopleeveryone.</u>
- Cultural: Art, cultural resources and activities/exists-each, historic assets, and live musice-while-ear
  are supported thrive and found in every neighborhood, are accessible to everyone, and work to
  celebrate our diverse community, bring people from all areas of the city together, and support
  the historic resources emphasize the importance of culture in the community and to
  contribution to equits and the local exponsiry.



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
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
**Resilient.** All facets of the community, including housing, infrastructure, and social services are sustainable and resilient to hazards and economic changes.

Vision Acceptance

The Project Team will utilize the Vision Statement and wealth of community comments and ideas to develop initial land use, mobility, and policy Alternatives.

Alternatives/Options

Map and policy alternatives will be presented to the community during the next phase of the project for review and feedback (Summer/Fall 2021), through a variety of virtual and in-person engagement events and activities.

#### Recommendation

It is recommended by the Planning & Economic Development Department that the City Council and Planning Commission review and provide input on the draft Vision Statement developed to help guide the preparation of the General Plan 2050 Update.
