

Public Art in Private Development Update

Art in Public Places Committee October 4, 2021

History

- Ordinance adopted in November 2006
- Encourages the placement of public art on-site with the understanding that public art helps to enliven our city, and makes public areas more welcoming
- Applies to private, commercial development with valuations of \$500,000 and greater (excluding residential and industrial)
- 1% requirement can be fulfilled by placing artwork on-site, or contributing in-lieu to the City's Public Art Fund
- Last update to APPC presented in March 2019






