
Upward Bound Programs

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- 9th-12th grade program
- Mandatory 6-week Summer Academy
- Saturday Academy every other week during the school year
- Field trips and college tours
- Workshops, 1-1 tutoring, test

- Both day and overnight trips
- Transportation, tickets, meals, and hotel provided
- Usually consist of a college visit and a trip to a nearby activity
 - Ex: SF state tour, Giants

Summer Academy/ Workshop

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• Length depends on program:

- UB: 6 weeks
- ATS: 1 week
- Monday Friday 8:30am-2:30 pm
- 60-90 minute class periods
- Games, activities, spirit days, workshops, guest speakers, and more!
- Transportation and meal/snacks provided



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- 10 Saturdays per school year, 5 per semester
- Games, workshops, activities, guest speakers, and field trips
- Transportation and meal/snacks provided







Academic Advising

- Each student is assigned to an advisor.
- Advisors visit schools and host workshops
- Students can schedule office visits and meet 1-1 with their advisor

Who qualifies?

Some programs require US Citizenship or Permanent Residency

- Families who meet at least one of the following requirements:
 - -Low-income families

-Families where neither parent/guardian has a 4year bachelor's degree awarded in the US -Children in the foster care system or houseless youth

Who counts as "low income"

The Federal Government makes that decision

Who counts as "first generation"

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Any student whose parent(s) or guardian(s) fit into the categories below:

- Never received a <u>4-year</u>
 <u>Bachelor's Degree</u>
- Have an Associate's Degree
- Have completed some college, but never earned a degree
- Are currently in college
- Went to vocational school or trade school

What's the application process?

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Checklists for each program

Academic Talent Search:

- Fully filled out and signed application
- One short answer question
- Full Transcript with most recent grades
- Our team will process and score each application
- Decision letters will be released on a rolling basis
 - Students could start the program as early as Spring 2025 if they apply early

Upward Bound:

- Fully filled out and signed application
- Seven short answer questions and a personal statement
- Income Verification Form
- 1 Teacher Recommendation & 1 Counselor Recommendation
- Full Transcript with most recent grades
- Once application is processed, our team will schedule a student/parent interview
- Decision letters will be released in April of 2025
