Dear Mayor Rogers and Members of the Santa Rosa City Council,

The largest project on the Transportation and Public Works proposed CIP budget is a \$4.6 million reconstruction of Calistoga Road between Highway 12 and Montecito Boulevard. There was mention at the April meeting of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Board that this project might include the construction of buffered bike lanes near Maria Carillo High School, but no mention of bicycle and pedestrian improvements further south on Calistoga near Sequoia Elementary School.

If the city is going to make the considerable investment to fix Calistoga Road, it must be to benefit **all** users, including bicyclists and pedestrians, and especially for children and families traveling to school. The Safe Routes to School Task Force has conducted an audit of the area around Sequoia, with the participation of parents, administrators and city staff. The audit concluded that potential longterm solutions to address the school's concerns around traffic safety should include:

- Protected (class IV) bicycle lanes
- Bulbouts to shorten pedestrian crossings
- The narrowing of vehicle travel lanes to reduce traffic speeds

All of these solutions must be seriously considered as part of the reconstruction project, along its entire length. Class II bike lanes, which currently exist on parts of Calistoga Road, are not adequate on roads with high speeds and high levels of traffic. These bike lanes need to be upgraded to class IV facilities -- not only to benefit bicyclists and pedestrians, but also to help calm traffic and improve safety for all users on a very busy corridor.

Honorary Mayor, Vice Mayor, and Council Members of the Santa Rosa City Council,

We have an urgent Community Challenge regarding Public Safety within our Santa Rosa City School District, which demands a Community Solution. Public Safety is a basic necessity of the citizens of Santa Rosa and should always be at the Highest Priority within City Services delivered. It is imperative that School Resource Officers return to Santa Rosa City High Schools and Middle Schools. With Schools and the City facing budget challenges and tough decisions, you have the power to lead the way in making this a budget priority. A strong consideration would be to allocate sufficient funding in the 2024/2025 City of Santa Rosa budget to fully fund a School Resource Officer (SRO) program in the initial amount of \$2,100,000 and \$1,700,000 for ongoing annual operations. For program continuity you could consider an ongoing annual commitment of funding for a minimum of five years. The highest priority of School District funding should be on Education. Even with the City of Santa Rosa taking on the full financial burden of the SRO program, the School and School District staff will participate in the SRO program and thus their funding is supporting the program's success. The School District is currently funding Social and Emotion Learning Curriculum; Campus Supervisors; Therapists; Family Engagement Facilitators; Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Intervention Counselors; and Restorative Specialists, all can be viewed as upstream investments, which over time should reduce City spending on societal behavioral issues. In addition, once funds are allocated and a program is in place, there are numerous opportunities for external funding sources by Endowment Programs, State Grants, Federal Grants, etc... to supplement future City spending. There must be leadership in bringing this critical need forward, and those leaders are you.

As a concerned community member, I have been following the current challenges our Santa Rosa City Schools face with ongoing violence and disruptions on campuses. While the talk within the community and media focuses on the incidents and the slow response of the Santa Rosa City School Board toward corrective action, I want to emphasize that the unintended consequences (negative impacts) of the circumstances run much wider. These unintended consequences impact the City of Santa Rosa as a Community and needs Council Action:

- ☒ A recently released January 2024 Youth Truth Survey conducted on behalf, and at the request of, the Santa Rosa City School District reflected deeply troubling results regarding student perception of School Safety. A meager 44% of high school students and 40% of middle school students were able to provide a positive response to "I Feel Safe at School". The survey also shows a declining trend year over year in this answer from 54%/51% in 2022 to 48%/45% in 2023 and again 44%/40% in 2024. The 2024 survey had a 79% response rate from students, so clearly a valid sampling.
- ☒ Parents are worried about their children's safety at our schools. Anxiety is known to have a negative impact on health and wellbeing. Anxiety also impacts one's ability to focus and be effective at work or in daily tasks. Stress and anxiety lead to higher rates of depression.
- ☒ Parents are making decisions as early as grade school to avoid their children's future attendance at certain Middle and High Schools in Santa Rosa. This migration will not only impact the schools being avoided, but also the schools that will eventually take in these "displaced" students. It also negatively impacts those that have actual needs to attend a school outside of their area.
- ☒ There is a growing concern that students, teachers, and faculty begin to take protection into their own hands in an effort to feel safe.

- ☒ Schools and receiving a quality education are one of the primary drivers of a sound economy and business environment. Businesses make decisions on where to locate based on the ability to hire employees and employees prioritize where to live based on schools and the quality education that is offered.
- ☒ Schools are employers also. We know that budgets and teacher/faculty pay are in constant conflict. Add in a chaotic unsafe work environment and schools will have increased struggles with hiring.
- ☒ It is extremely difficult to garner community support for schools if people do not believe the system is heading in the right direction and is operating without a sound plan to correct the course.

The list goes on and on. I firmly believe that we need School Resource Officer's on our Middle and High school campuses. They can assist in getting the violent acts under control in the short term. In the long term they can be an active participant in a supportive school culture along with teachers, counselors, restorative specialists, campus supervisors, faculty, parents, coaches and peers.

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

We have an urgent Community Challenge regarding Public Safety within our Santa Rosa City School District, which demands a Community Solution. Public Safety is a basic necessity of the citizens of Santa Rosa and should always be at the Highest Priority within City Services delivered. It is imperative that School Resource Officers return to Santa Rosa City High Schools and Middle Schools. With Schools and the City facing budget challenges and tough decisions, you have the power to lead the way in making this a budget priority. A strong consideration would be to allocate sufficient funding in the 2024/2025 City of Santa Rosa budget to fully fund a School Resource Officer (SRO) program in the initial amount of \$2,100,000 and \$1,700,000 for ongoing annual operations. For program continuity you could consider an ongoing annual commitment of funding for a minimum of five years. The highest priority of School District funding should be on Education. Even with the City of Santa Rosa taking on the full financial burden of the SRO program, the School and School District staff will participate in the SRO program and thus their funding is supporting the program's success. The School District is currently funding Social and Emotion Learning Curriculum; Campus Supervisors; Therapists; Family Engagement Facilitators; Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Intervention Counselors; and Restorative Specialists, all can be viewed as upstream investments, which over time should reduce City spending on societal behavioral issues. In addition, once funds are allocated and a program is in place, there are numerous opportunities for external funding sources by Endowment Programs, State Grants, Federal Grants, etc... to supplement future City spending. There must be leadership in bringing this critical need forward, and those leaders are you.

As a concerned community member, I have been following the current challenges our Santa Rosa City Schools face with ongoing violence and disruptions on campuses. While the talk within the community and media focuses on the incidents and the slow response of the Santa Rosa City School Board toward corrective action, I want to emphasize that the unintended consequences (negative impacts) of the circumstances run much wider. We have an urgent Community Challenge regarding Public Safety within our Santa Rosa City School District, which demands a Community Solution. Public Safety is a basic necessity of the citizens of Santa Rosa and should always be at the Highest Priority within City Services delivered. It is imperative that School Resource Officers return to Santa Rosa City High Schools and Middle Schools. With Schools and the City facing budget challenges and tough decisions, you have the power to lead the way in making this a budget priority. A strong consideration would be to allocate sufficient funding in the 2024/2025 City of Santa Rosa budget to fully fund a School Resource Officer (SRO) program in the initial amount of \$2,100,000 and \$1,700,000 for ongoing annual operations. For program continuity you could consider an ongoing annual commitment of funding for a minimum of five years. The highest priority of School District funding should be on Education. Even with the City of Santa Rosa taking on the full financial burden of the SRO program, the School and School District staff will participate in the SRO program and thus their funding is supporting the program's success. The School District is currently funding Social and Emotion Learning Curriculum; Campus Supervisors; Therapists; Family Engagement Facilitators; Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Intervention Counselors; and Restorative Specialists, all can be viewed as upstream investments, which over time should reduce City spending on societal behavioral issues. In addition, once funds are allocated and a program is in place, there are numerous opportunities for external funding sources by Endowment Programs, State Grants, Federal Grants, etc... to supplement future City spending. There must be leadership in bringing this critical need forward, and those leaders are you.

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

We have an urgent Community Challenge regarding Public Safety within our Santa Rosa City School District, which demands a Community Solution. Public Safety is a basic necessity of the citizens of Santa Rosa and should always be at the Highest Priority within City Services delivered. It is imperative that School Resource Officers return to Santa Rosa City High Schools and Middle Schools. With Schools and the City facing budget challenges and tough decisions, you have the power to lead the way in making this a budget priority. A strong consideration would be to allocate sufficient funding in the 2024/2025 City of Santa Rosa budget to fully fund a School Resource Officer (SRO) program in the initial amount of \$2,100,000 and \$1,700,000 for ongoing annual operations. For program continuity you could consider an ongoing annual commitment of funding for a minimum of five years. The highest priority of School District funding should be on Education. Even with the City of Santa Rosa taking on the full financial burden of the SRO program, the School and School District staff will participate in the SRO program and thus their funding is supporting the program's success. The School District is currently funding Social and Emotion Learning Curriculum; Campus Supervisors; Therapists; Family Engagement Facilitators; Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Intervention Counselors; and Restorative Specialists, all can be viewed as upstream investments, which over time should reduce City spending on societal behavioral issues. In addition, once funds are allocated and a program is in place, there are numerous opportunities for external funding sources by Endowment Programs, State Grants, Federal Grants, etc... to supplement future City spending. There must be leadership in bringing this critical need forward, and those leaders are you.

As a concerned community member, I have been following the current challenges our Santa Rosa City Schools face with ongoing violence and disruptions on campuses. While the talk within the community and media focuses on the incidents and the slow response of the Santa Rosa City School Board toward corrective action, I want to emphasize that the unintended consequences (negative impacts) of the circumstances run much wider. These unintended consequences impact the City of Santa Rosa as a Community and needs Council Action:

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- ☒ Parents are worried about their children's safety at our schools. Anxiety is known to have a negative impact on health and wellbeing. Anxiety also impacts one's ability to focus and be effective at work or in daily tasks. Stress and anxiety lead to higher rates of depression.
- ☒ Parents are making decisions as early as grade school to avoid their children's future attendance at certain Middle and High Schools in Santa Rosa. This migration will not only impact the schools being avoided, but also the schools that will eventually take in these "displaced" students. It also negatively impacts those that have actual needs to attend a school outside of their area.
- ☒ There is a growing concern that students, teachers, and faculty begin to take protection into their own hands in an effort to feel safe.

- ☒ Schools and receiving a quality education are one of the primary drivers of a sound economy and business environment. Businesses make decisions on where to locate based on the ability to hire employees and employees prioritize where to live based on schools and the quality education that is offered.
- ☒ Schools are employers also. We know that budgets and teacher/faculty pay are in constant conflict. Add in a chaotic unsafe work environment and schools will have increased struggles with hiring.
- ☒ It is extremely difficult to garner community support for schools if people do not believe the system is heading in the right direction and is operating without a sound plan to correct the course.

I am contacting you regarding the need for SROs on SRCS campuses. I am using the letter below because this is all information I agree with and the below information outlines all the important details.

However, I want to convey myself how disappointed I am in the Santa Rosa City Schools Board for disregarding the safety of your students and OUR children. I watched the Board meeting via Zoom when the decision was made to halt the SRO program, and it was very clear the Board members were putting their own feelings before the safety of our kids. It is now the ultimate "mission" of some of the Board members to do everything in their power to prevent the placement of SROs.

The job of SRCS is to keep our children safe. However, violence continues to skyrocket, and a child's life was lost last year. You should be doing everything in your power to stop this. I've listened to numerous students plead with the Board – sometimes in tears – because they do not feel safe at school. These school years should be some of the best times in their lives, and they should not have to go to school in fear. I also should not have to send my student to school every day wondering if he will be safe. Every time I hear about a lockdown, I panic. The last time my student was on shelter in place he thought it was the same as a lockdown and he was texting me very nervous because he did not know what was going on.

I understand there are some students who do not feel comfortable with SROs on campus, but with the right program, I feel we can make everyone feel safe. It is wrong to deny SROs from the overwhelming number of students and parents who are begging for them. My student is a freshman this year and I want to know that he has the benefit of an SRO on campus.

With Schools and the City facing budget challenges and tough decisions, you have the power to lead the way in making this a budget priority. A strong consideration would be to allocate sufficient funding in the 2024/2025 City of Santa Rosa budget to fully fund a School Resource Officer (SRO) program in the initial amount of \$2,100,000 and \$1,700,000 for ongoing annual operations. For program continuity you could consider an ongoing annual commitment of funding for a minimum of five years. The highest priority of School District funding should be on Education. Even with the City of Santa Rosa taking on the full financial burden of the SRO program, the School and School District staff will participate in the SRO program and thus their funding is supporting the program's success. The School District is currently funding Social and Emotion Learning Curriculum; Campus Supervisors; Therapists; Family Engagement Facilitators; Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Intervention Counselors; and Restorative Specialists, all can be viewed as upstream investments, which over time should reduce City spending on societal behavioral issues. A meager 44% of high school students and 40% of middle school students were able to provide a positive response to "I Feel Safe at School". The survey also shows a declining trend year over year in this answer from 54%/51% in 2022 to 48%/45% in 2023 and again 44%/40% in 2024. The 2024 survey had a 79% response rate from students, so clearly a valid sampling.
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- ☒ There is a growing concern that students, teachers, and faculty begin to take protection into their own hands in an effort to feel safe.
