








Annual Residential Permits Issued



Transportation Element

Bicycle & Pedestrian Highlights

- Completed Local Road Safety Plan including corridor studies of Fourth Street, Montgomery Drive, and North Dutton Avenue for bicycle and pedestrian enhancements.
- Completed a bicycle parking inventory for Downtown and Railroad Square.
- Corridor studies completed in 2022 that were part of a Local Road Safety grant include:
 - Fourth Street E Street to Farmers Lane
 - College Avenue Kowell Lane to Fourth Street
 - Montgomery Drive Alderbrook Drive to Hahman Drive
 - Roseland Creek Trail Stony Point Road to Burbank Avenue
 - North Dutton Avenue West College Avenue to West Third Street





Transportation Element

Transit Highlights:

- Fixed-route ridership totals were 1,028,440 in fiscal year 2021-2022, up from 760,000 in fiscal year 2020 -2021
- UR Free Program continuation and success
- Unlimited Rides Pass Program
- Discounts or free fares are provided for SRJC students, veterans, youth, seniors, Medicare card holders, low-income adults, and persons living with a disability





Public Services and Facilities Element

Parks Highlights:

- Colgan Creek Park: playground equipment, completed February 2022
- Kawana Springs Community Garden: drawings finalized; construction expected Summer 2023
- Bennett Valley Golf Course: operation & maintenance agreement with Touchstone for the golf course, driving range, and Iron & Vine restaurant and event center
- <u>DeTurk Round Barn Park</u>: new paved picnic area and tables installed
- Bayer Park: original concrete tables replaced with steel tables; two ADA accessible
- South Davis Park: planning and outreach done for Master Plan amendment
- <u>Dutch Flohr Park</u>: Master Plan amendment underway to update equipment and accessibility
- <u>Finley Aquatic Center</u>: Sprayground renovation project planning done; construction expected Fall 2023







Public Services and Facilities Element

Police Services Highlights:

- Responded to 203,547 calls for service in 2022
- Community-oriented policing efforts by assigning officers and sergeants to specific beats throughout the City
- 236 firearms seized during criminal investigations, 74 of these were ghost guns
- inRESPSONSE Mental Health Support Team



Fire Services Highlights:

- Responded to 29,927 calls for service in 2022
- Auto Aid Agreements with Sonoma County Fire District and Kenwood Fire District
- Participation in Santa Rosa Mutual Threat Zone
 Operating Plan: joint response plan with Sonoma
 County Fire District and CALFIRE to cover specific
 WUI areas





Public Services and Facilities Element

Water and Wastewater

- Laguna Treatment Plan is hub for Regional Water Reuse System, recycling wastewater.
 In 2022, 5.77 billion gallons of sewage received treatment
- CIP-approved Disinfection Improvement Project at Laguna Treatment Plan: construction began in 2022
- Water use efficiency efforts







Open Space and Conservation Element

- Creek Stewardship Program: community volunteers contributed nearly 3,700 service hours towards trail maintenance, care of creek restoration projects, and removal of trash from creeks (1,100 + cubic yards). One hundred twenty-six volunteer creek cleanups occurred on 20 different creeks
- Colgan Creek restoration work continues, including construction of a paved path





Arts and Culture Element

Several goals met in Public Art Strategic Plan Implementation:

- Public Art audit
- Partnerships with City Departments
- Grants for arts organizations
- Grants for artists
- Ongoing maintenance of art
- Public relations and marketing improvements







Noise and Safety Element

- Purchase of two wildland fire engines and one tactical water tender for wildland fires
- Fire Station 5 replacement planning work commenced
- HCD grant of \$500,000 to fund education, outreach and assessment in City's WUI
- Water Department launched Water Supply Alternatives project
- No incidents that required activation of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in 2022





Historic Preservation Element

- Historic Resource Evaluation of Downtown Station Area completed
- 12 Landmark Alteration Permits submitted in 2022







Youth and Family Element

City's Support Program Facility Fund: Childcare facility development and rehabilitation (less program administration costs) with ARPA and General Fund seed funding

Children's Savings Account: establishing savings accounts for 2–5-year-olds in the City, administered by First 5 Sonoma County, using ARPA funding

Santa Rosa Violence Prevention Partnership (The Partnership): Measure H CHOICE grant funded programs to City schools and non-profit organization for school readiness, street outreach & mediation, student engagement + disbursed \$1.875M in grant awards to eight local agencies







Climate Action Plan

- Existing Community Climate Action Plan will be updated as part of City's comprehensive General Plan update.
- Readopted an All-Electric Reach Code as part of the CALGreen standards applicable through 2025 for new low-rise residential buildings
- Bird scooters approved as part of Scooter Share Pilot Program
- Recology's Zero Waste team conducted 654 site audits/site visits, 111 trainings/presentations, initiated recycling at 24 establishments, and started composting programs for 167 accounts






Growth Management

Allotments

- 2022: 800 new allotments available (400 Reserve "A", 400 Reserve "B)
- 1,110 Reserve "A" qualifying units permitted (includes 710 allotments which remained available from 2011-2015)
- 91 Reserve "B" qualifying units permitted





Inclusionary Housing

Between January 1 and December 31, 2022:

- 402 allocated units were issued building permits
- \$1.79 million was collected in Housing Impact Fees
- Since 1992, a total of 2,010 affordable units have been supported through Housing Impact Fees
